FIRST EDITION BOOK CLUB: "The Home for Unwanted Girls" by Joanna Goodman. The book is a historical novel set in Quebec during the 1950's when hostilities divided French and English-speaking Canadians. The story reflects the shame of unwed mothers and their offspring. Fifteen year old Maggie gives up her daughter Elodie to an orphanage. Many Catholic orphans during this time are transitioned to mental asylums to receive more funding per child per government. The book reflects the brutality, neglect and abuse suffered by the children while there. It also illustrates the difficulties experienced due to lack of knowledge and experience when the orphans are released into society. The book ends when the mother and her daughter are reunited. The book was well received by all and rated 4.5. Submitted by Violet Svirplys.

THE BOOKIES BOOK CLUB: "The Nine Lives of Charlotte Taylor" by award winning Canadian journalist, Sally Armstrong. It tells the account of the author's 3X great grandmother. Some of the facts in the book are true which made the story seem very believable. Charlotte is one of the first European female settlers in New Brunswick in the 1700's. We are introduced to the historical hardships of pioneer men, women and the MicMac.
